

OUR FACILITATORS

WILKIE AU, PH.D. is a Professor of Theological Studies at Loyola Marymount University, where he teaches in the area of spirituality and coordinates the graduate concentration in spiritual direction. His *By Way of the Heart: Toward a Holistic Christian Spirituality* won the 1990 Book Award of the College Theology Society and his *Enduring Heart: Spirituality for the Long Haul* won an award from the Catholic Press Association of the United States and Canada in 2001.

DON BISSON, FMS is a spiritual director, trainer and supervisor of directors. He is widely respected as a commentator and workshop leader on the interrelationship of spirituality and psychology. A Marist brother based in New York, he has graduate degrees in Liturgy, Spirituality, and Transpersonal Psychology. He has a Doctor of Ministry degree from the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California, in the areas of Spiritual Direction and Jungian Psychology.

THOMAS P. BONACCI, CP has ministered in the Diocese of Oakland since 1990 and serves as a member of the Interreligious and Ecumenical Commission. Tom is a graduate of St. John's University, New York City. After Ordination to the priesthood in 1972, he served as religious superior, Pastor, and Retreat Director in Pittsburgh, PA, New York City, and Atlanta, GA. He served as chaplain at East Carolina University in Greenville, NC and Carlow University, Pittsburgh, PA. He established the Interfaith Center at Carlow University (September 8, 2001) where he taught Sacred Scripture. Tom is the founder of the Interfaith Peace Project of Contra Costa County, CA, a home-based educational outreach providing introductions to the world religions. He is the Director of the Interfaith Center of Antioch, CA which opened in October 2007. He serves on the Board of Directors for the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County and the Interfaith Observer, an on-line journal surveying topics related to the Interfaith world. Tom conducts Seminars in Interfaith spirituality for the School of Applied Theology, Oakland, CA and the Interfaith Chaplaincy School, Berkeley, CA. Tom also ministers at the Christ the King Passionist Retreat Center of Citrus Heights, CA.

JOHN BRUNA is a counselor, educator, former Tibetan Buddhist monk, and current mindfulness teacher. Raised in a low-income environment where he was surrounded by drugs, alcohol, and violence, John was able to find recovery and change the course of his life at the early age of 22. Having transformed his own life, John devoted his life to helping others transform theirs, first as a substance abuse counselor and then as a teacher at a low-income, minority school in Long Beach, California. Having met his spiritual mentor, Venerable Geshe Tsultim Gyeltsen, John was ordained and trained as a Buddhist monk in the Tibetan tradition. After more than six years of monastic life, John returned to life as a layperson and became an engaging, inspirational and authentic teacher. John is able to draw from his education and training, as well as his compelling life story and personal experiences to illustrate with clarity the skillful application of the wisdom teachings found in all traditions. Currently, John is the co-founder of the Mindful Life Program and director of the Way of Compassion Foundation.

DEACON CHARLES "RED" CHEEVER has a Master of Arts degree from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley. He served as Chair of Theology at Loretto High School for more than 32 years. In 1983, Red was ordained Deacon in the Catholic Church, and in 1993 joined the International Satsang Association. Red's focus is on exploring the interface of - - and dialogue between - - Christianity and other major religions.

FR. MICHAEL CROSBY, OFMCAP, belongs to the Midwest Province of the Capuchin Franciscans. The majority of Fr. Mike's ministry is spent writing and speaking about biblical spirituality geared for our "First World" society.

SR. KATHERINE DOYLE, RSM, is a member of the Sisters of Mercy, West Midwest. Trained in history and spirituality, she has ministered in education, faith formation and retreat ministries. She has served as US Institute Novitiate Minister for the Sisters of Mercy, Director of Faith Formation for the Sacramento Diocese, Director of Mercy Center, and Pastoral Associate at Holy Spirit Parish, Sacramento. She is currently engaged in the ministries of spiritual direction, retreat facilitation and writing.

JOHN ENSIGN, PHD, is a clinical psychologist and Jungian Analyst. He is also a spiritual director with extensive background in Christian Spirituality and the Contemplative Tradition.

JAMES FINLEY, PHD spent six years in the cloistered Trappist Monastery of the Abbey of Gethsemani where the world-renowned monk and author, Thomas Merton, was his spiritual director. Now a writer, practicing psychologist, and retreat leader, his latest book is *Christian Meditation: Experiencing the Presence of God*. He leads retreats and workshops throughout the United States and Canada, attracting men and women who seek to live a contemplative way of life in the midst of today's busy world.

MICHAEL FISH is a member of the New Camaldoli Hermitage in Big Sur California. Michael has been given permission by his community to explore solitude and the way of the hermit in greater depth. Although he returns to the Hermitage regularly, he currently lives as a hermit, in solitude and prayer. Solitude is only part of his calling and he offers retreats, talks and spiritual direction to his brothers and sisters in religious and lay communities.
